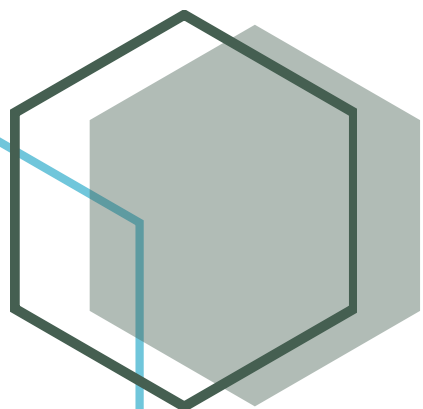

Message from the Executive Director

Thanks to so many of you, Prisoner Visitation and Support (PVS) continued to support people incarcerated in federal and military prisons in 2021 – whether by visiting in person or by writing letters. It wasn't easy – Covid variants kept many prisons from opening to visits at all, while others opened and closed again. PVS visitors were steadfast in their work, however, keeping in touch as best they could.

Here at the national office in Philadelphia, our small staff worked very hard to support our visitors with monthly trainings via Zoom, email newsletters with updates on the Bureau of Prisons and other information, and telephone outreach to visitors to check-in.

We also worked closely with our Board of Directors to prepare a five-year strategic plan to guide our work, a summary of which you can find on our website, www.prisonervisitation.org.

We were also excited to present our first virtual event in October, 2021, "The Power of Visiting," with artist, activist, and podcaster Luis "Suave" Gonzalez. Suave talked about the significant impact visitors can have on people incarcerated, both in improving their daily life behind bars and once they return to their home communities. We hope to continue the series this year – stay tuned!

We hope that 2022 will mean a large-scale return to in-person visiting, and are busily preparing for that day. We plan to welcome many new volunteer visitors this year, and support those who have been waiting so long to return. Our vision – that any person incarcerated in federal prison who wants a visitor will have one – remains our driving force. Thanks for all you do to help us get closer to that goal.

Our Mission

Prisoner Visitation and Support (PVS) is a volunteer visitation program for people incarcerated in federal and military prisons throughout the United States.

Our mission is to provide prisoners with regular, face to face contact from the world outside of prison to help them cope with prison life, encourage personal growth, and prepare for successful reentry into society.

Our vision is to provide qualified visitors to fulfill all requests for visits by prisoners in every federal and military prison.

Our priority is to visit those prisoners who: do not ordinarily receive visits from family and friends; are in solitary confinement; are on death row; or are serving long sentences.



Message from the Board Chair

2021 was quite an eventful year for PVS!

Despite ongoing challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Board and staff had an incredibly productive year.

The Board completed a thorough overhaul of our bylaws. We adopted a comprehensive new strategic plan to guide our efforts into 2026. We welcomed three new talented Board members: Mike Guerra, Liz Leshner, and Brian Lewis.

In addition, at our last meeting of 2021, we voted to welcome two additional Board members to join us in January 2022: Suave Gonzalez and Erika Janifer. Each of these new Board members brings a distinct depth of knowledge, experience and skills vital to PVS.

Zoom was our friend, as the Board met using this platform for seven Board meetings in this year. We also used Zoom for our annual meeting with the BOP Director and his staff. Remaining keenly aware of what is transpiring within the Bureau of Prisons, PVS stays in close touch [with both people and policies] at the national, regional, and local levels.

Appreciating again our devoted staff, we recognized Ellen Gilkenson in her retirement and look forward to the appointment of her successor.

At the end of 2021, I completed six and a half years as Chair of the PVS Board, happily turning over the reins to Tom Slick as the new Board Chair in 2022. I am unfailingly grateful for the generosity of our loyal donors and visitors, who sustain PVS day after day, year after year.

Visitor Report



While 2021 found most federal and military facilities closed, either due to Covid numbers or security concerns, that did not stop PVS Visitors from being there to support those behind prison walls. After facilities closed in 2020, PVS was given special permission by the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) to write letters to those we were visiting before Covid hit. In 2021 alone, PVS Visitors wrote over 1,000 letters!

This past year, the Training Committee, with the help of staff (and Zoom!) hosted 9 training sessions for visitors. Topics ranged from understanding the trauma many incarcerated people face, to supporting someone when they are dealing with grief while in prison, to the best way to maintain boundaries while you are visiting. The Training Committee is hard at work on more sessions for this year!

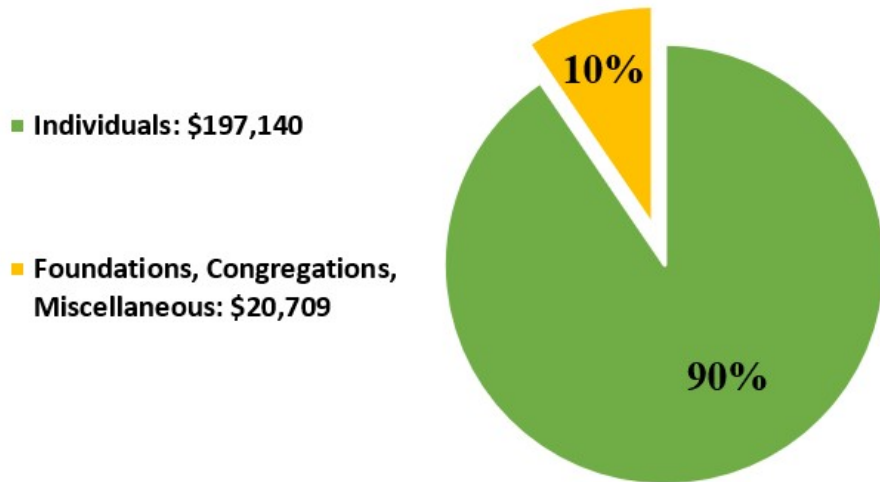

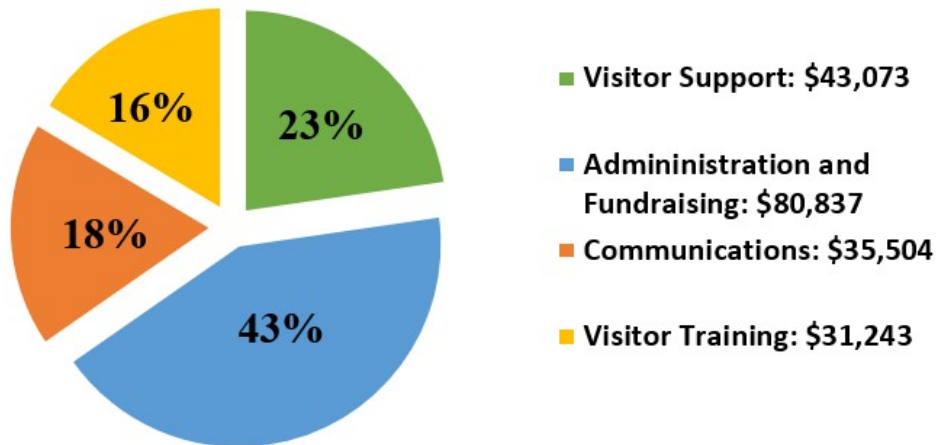

In Memory of Teresa Batto

It is with heavy hearts that we share the passing of longtime Visitor and friend of PVS, Teresa Batto. Teresa passed away on January 31st, 2022, at the age of 80, after a battle with bone cancer. She was a PVS visitor at FCC Terre Haute in Terre Haute, Indiana for 31 years. Over the years, Teresa visited with many men on death row, bringing them light and kindness in a dark place.

We would like to take this time to share some tributes from Teresa's friends:

"Teresa was the kind of person that gives you hope for the human race. Her life was filled with activities and commitments that were important; yet she never struck you as seeing herself as significant. She was kind, helpful, warm, trustworthy, and totally competent.

In the 20 years I knew her as our Terre Haute coordinator for PVS, she never missed getting the proper arrangements made with the prison staff. If I had an issue with my visiting (and I had several), I counted on her to understand, empathize, and offer excellent advice. She regularly hosted her motley gang of visitors in her home where she and Bernie provided a hearty welcome, constructive discussions, and excellent food.

And if we wanted someone to show us how to deal with serious illness, she was it. She fought cancer ten years ago, without fanfare or complaint, needing no sympathy. And she beat it. Sad was the day when we heard it had returned. And sad we are now to know she's gone.

We will no longer hear her slight Texas drawl as she cheers us on to continue bringing some humanity and caring to the incarcerated. God bless her! God knows a good woman when he sees her."
